

FARMING WITH PURPOSE

When the Bethel Bible College campus was located in Windsor Castle, St. Mary, the concept of farming the land became a reality. At that time, the initiative served as both a training and assessment tool for student pastors. The idea was simple but profound: if a student pastor could faithfully care for plants, they could also be trusted to care for people in a church.

Over the years, however, the practice of farming faded into dormancy. That changed in the 2024–2025 academic year when Students' Association President, Odaine Walters, reignited the initiative among the residential students.

Farming is no longer used as a means of assessment. Instead, portions of the expansive campus property are now cultivated to help feed the student population and reduce food costs. This has been a welcome and refreshing shift, bringing variety to meals, improving nutrition, and fostering a spirit of community and responsibility.

More than that, farming has become a character-building exercise. Students are not afraid to get their hands dirty—a reflection of the humility and resilience that may be required in the mission field.

The crops are tended to daily. At present, the land produces fruit trees such as otaheite apples and cherries, along with pineapples, mangoes, bananas, plantains, tomatoes and herbs. Students are grateful for the opportunity to engage with the land, describing the experience as lifechanging.

We continue to pray that the initiative grows and that the land remains fruitful for years to come.



EASTER: A SEASON OF RESPONSE

The Easter season is a time of reflection on the life, ministry, and atoning work of Jesus Christ. Through His one-time sacrifice, all humanity can be saved from the wrath of God. That is God, the Father, poured out his wrath on his own son so that all who believe may live.

We have a blazing hope in Christ because He rose triumphantly from the

grave. Our proclamation and faith are grounded in truth, and our sins are covered. (1 Cor. 15:13-17).

Believers in this season are not just to reflect on Christ's work but to respond to it. Essentially, our knowledge of Christ through the Word must determine what we believe and how we live. St. Luke 24:13-35 can serve as a guide for responding.

The passage recalls a conversation between two disciples as they travelled to Emmaus. Their journey was filled with lament as they gave a social commentary on the recent events in Jerusalem. The headlines over the period would have read, "Jesus, Crucified!" followed by, "Empty Tomb -Corpse Missing!" Hope was lost because he was expected to be the redeemer of Israel.

Jesus, who joined them incognito during the journey, expounds the Scriptures to them about Himself. He breaks bread with them later, their eyes are opened, they recognise Him, and He vanishes, prompting them to return to Jerusalem to tell the others.

Here are three responses:

1. Faith - Christ is the fulfilment of prophecy (verses 19-21)

"O foolish ones, and slow of heart to believe in all that the prophets have spoken! Ought not the Christ to have suffered these things and to enter into His Glory?"

A faith response is rooted in the truth of Scripture. Jesus is the fulfilment of prophecy. We are to believe that his death, burial, and resurrection are a reality which changes our perspective on life.

2. Forward Look - Anticipating Resurrection (verses 26-27)

Look up!

Christ's resurrection assures us of a future reign with Him. Just as He died and was raised, we, too, who die in the Lord, will also live again. Paul encourages that, "Since, then, you have been raised with Christ, set your hearts on things above, where Christ is, seated at the right hand of God. Set your minds on things above, not on earthly things. For you died, and your life is now hidden with Christ in God. When Christ, who is your life, appears, then you also will appear with him in glory." (Col. 3:1-4)

3. Fellowship – Conversation and Connection (verse 33)

"So, they rose up that very hour and returned to Jerusalem... saying, 'The Lord is risen indeed and has appeared to Simon."

Conversations with believers and non-believers can help to reinforce the truth of Christ in the hearts of men. As we go on the job, in the streets, etc., let us talk about Jesus. When we talk about Him, He will come alongside us and enlighten our discourse. This is what His divine command is: to go! And His divine promise is his presence. (Matt: 28:19-20).

Easter is about the head, the heart, and the hands.

Knowing Christ stirs our hearts to believe, and that belief moves our hands to act. Let us reflect, respond, and rejoice in what our Saviour has done.
